

# October 2012 Community Report Aging Committee Legislative Priorities

In my capacity as Chair of the Assembly Standing Committee on Aging there are a number of issues that will be top priorities during the 2013 legislative session including housing, Alzheimer's disease and elder abuse. In New York City's prohibitively expensive housing market, the Senior Citizen Rental Increase Exemption (SCRIE) program is absolutely vital. SCRIE allows low income seniors to freeze their rent at current levels. After a hearing I held at the State Office building in Manhattan last year several bills that would have expanded and improved SCRIE were introduced and passed in the Assembly. But these bills did not have Senate sponsors. I will be seeking senators to sponsor the bills to ensure not only passage but the Governor's signature. Legislative priorities often come from my discussions with constituents. In the photo to the right I am speaking with seniors at the Eileen C. Dugan senior center about their concerns.



Another issue of great concern is Alzheimer's disease which is the sixth leading cause of death in the United States, but is the only cause of death among the top 10 that has no treatment or prevention. Two bills have been introduced in the Assembly but not acted on by the Senate. One bill would provide for coverage under group and individual health insurance contracts for individuals with Alzheimer's. Elder abuse is another top priority of mine. At a roundtable held at Brooklyn Borough Hall on the issue, experts from across the state attended the event to discuss a wide range of abuse. Financial abuse was discussed by many, and unlike child abuse, New York State has no system in place to report such cases. Underreporting of these cases occurs when a family member is too embarrassed to complain about missing items, including cash. Bank tellers who notice large withdrawals too often do not feel comfortable reporting such events.
